All present rose for the invocation and President Peter proposed a toast to <u>The Rotary Club of Sundsvall</u>. This Club is one of the oldest in Sweden—the first class of clubs that was formed over 80 years ago. Their regular meeting place is the Scandic Sundsvall City Hotel. Sundsvall is the birthplace of Tony Gustavsson, coach of the Australian Matildas football team.

It has been decided that our Club will <u>fund a bursary</u> which will meet the tuition costs for four terms.

# Short & Sweet.



Graham Russell's recount of the exploits of William Charles Brown (better known as Tinker) took members deep into Wagga's past. Tinker and his wife Susannah were both convicts and met well after their arrivals in Australia. They came to Wagga where Susannah was a particularly successful businesswoman. Tinker was a little less so, as evidenced by his purchase of a travelling circus when he travelled to Parramatta. He travelled around southern NSW and northern Vic with this circus. In 1856, the circus was in Beechworth, when a Mr

Cameron rode into town on a horse called Castor, shod with golden shoes. Tinker bought the shoes and rode back to Wagga. In the meantime, a man named Moxham (employed by—and possibly related to—Brown) made bets with the locals that Brown would ride into Wagga on a horse shod with golden shoes. The bets were readily taken up, and Moxham (and probably Brown) stood to win a lot of money. Brown pulled up at a quiet place in the bush just out of Wagga and a blacksmith, sent out by Moxham put the shoes back on the horse. Tinker rode triumphantly into Wagga and Moxham collected the winnings. On what could only have been another trip to Beechworth, Tinker Brown died suddenly. His body was brought back to Wagga in a dugout from a gum tree, a common practice for a coffin in those days. He was buried in the old cemetery at Wagga, behind Church Hill. Later, when the new cemetery was opened (which is now the old one) the bodies were exhumed and reburied in the new one. Some years later, Susannah died, and she is buried alongside her husband. What happened to the shoes?? A Wagga bank manager, Mr. Crotte, tried to convince Mrs Brown to sell the Golden Shoes. It seems they eventually found their way to the Mint, were melted down into

sovereigns, and realised 96 pounds and sixteen shillings.

Every Easter, the town of Beechworth celebrates the Golden Horseshoes Festival.

This week we list the first five of Leanne's points: -

- 1. **Friendship:** In an increasingly complex world, Rotary provides one of the most basic human needs: the need for friendship and fellowship. It is one of two reasons why Rotary began in 1905.
- Business Development: The second original reason for Rotary's beginning is business
  development. Everyone needs to network. Rotary consists of a cross section of every business
  community. Its members come from all walks of life. Rotarians help each other and collectively help
  others.
- 3. **Personal Growth and Development:** Membership in Rotary continues one's growth and education in human relations and personal development.
- 4. **Leadership Development:** Rotary is an organization of leaders and successful people. Serving in Rotary positions is like a college education. Leadership: learning how to motivate, influence, and lead leaders.
- 5. **Citizenship in the Community:** Membership in a Rotary club makes one a better community citizen. The average Rotary club consists of the most active citizens of any community.
