There were thirty members in attendance along with guests Tom Lemerle and Olivia Jones, who were our Key-Note Speakers, and also guests of Anthony & Emily Bosco.

Administration Matters.

- President Peter noted with pleasure, that the weekly email Attendance Reminder is being completed
 as required each week. This makes organising catering at meetings very achievable.
- ◆ Documents relevant to the monthly theme (**Membership & New Development Month**) were distributed for information and comment. Comments to Pres Peter ASAP please.
- Corporate Membership is a concept recommended for Rotary Clubs to consider during this month. A
 document expanding upon this concept was distributed and the members was asked to consider this
 idea. There will be further discussions on this topic at a later date.

Fines-Master Session.

Graeme Callander relieved us of our hard-earned cash by firstly levying a fine on members with wedding anniversaries, birthdays etc.

Key-Note Speaker

Our joint Key-Note Speaker for the evening were Tom Lemerle & Olivia Jones from the Wagga Wagga Bike Canteen. They were introduced by President Peter.



Tom is a Project Manager with GHD and is active with numerous local projects, most notable being the Pommegalarna Cycling Project and the Museum of the Riverina redevelopment. Olivia works at TRAC, mainly in Human Relations – but is also happy to assist in other areas as required.

Tom and Olivia informed us of the Bike Canteen that they established in Wagga Wagga in September 2021. They renovate old bicycles and then donate them to needy people. The recipients include refugees, university students, people who have lost their driving licence and generally people with a need for this form of transport. Tom grew up in Wagga Wagga, having been educated at South Wagga Public School followed by Wagga Wagga High School and finally, relocated to Newcastle where he studied engineering. During his time at Newcastle he remodelled a bicycle for a disabled acquaintance.

He returned home to Wagga in 2020 and soon after established the Bike Canteen with a group of like-minded persons, including Olivia. The Bike Canteen is currently located in Rural Place behind the Masonic Hall – adjacent to The Press Coffee Shop.

They are more than happy to accept donated bikes and often receive unclaimed bikes from both the Wagga and Junee Police Stations. Donated bikes are either repaired or cannibalised for parts. They are regularly assisted by young people who are undertaking a Duke of Edinburgh Award, as volunteers as part of that program. The workshop is also made available to people who call in for a chat and are welcome repair and/or service their own bikes.





Funding of the project was initially from their own pockets followed by a grant from Riverina Water County Council. Income is an ongoing challenge and to assist with the finances, Olivia has entered the "Dirty 130" in the forthcoming Beers & Gears Festival; she is currently seeking sponsors. ROTARY CLUB OF WAGGA WAGGA - OUR HISTORY: -

Extract From **TROVE** - Our Club History – Meeting Report from 16th August 1933: -

The usual weekly meeting and luncheon of the members of the Wagga Rotary Club was held at the Commercial Hotel on Monday evening, when the president (Rotarian J. C. Blamey) presided. The 'talk' for the occasion was an 'International Understanding,' and the speaker was Rotarian R. Giltinan, BA. For 12 months Rotarian Giltinan was chairman of the International Service and drafted a letter from the members or the Wagga Club to Rotary clubs in all parts of the world. The letter was designed as a greeting in Rotary fellowship, and in addition to conveying warm regards from Wagga members, expressed the hope that, through contact of Rotary and kindred societies, a happier state of international understanding would be arrived at. The speaker said that it was gratifying to receive so many letters from different countries in which Rotary was established and he read several letters and commented on the friendly tone adopted. From the tone of these letters, it was evident that there was a strong desire in all countries for closer mutual contact and better understanding, and the speaker expressed the belief that through efforts of this kind, people in the different countries can eventually be drawn into closed relationship. The 'talk' was listened to with very close attention and the hope was expressed that further international nights of a similar nature would be arranged. A promise of this was given by the chairman of the International Service Committee.


