MEETING REPORT: -

ATTENDANCE:

President Peter welcomed members and guests to the last meeting for 2023. He led the Invocation to Rotary then proposed a toast to the Australian Cricket Team for their achievements in 2023, including winning the World Test Cricket Championship title in London, retaining the Ashes against England, and winning the One Day International Cricket World Cup in India.

There were 25 members and one guest present. Our visitor was Sally Short as a guest of Bryan. Peter also made a special welcome to Donna Goodwin, who was attending her first meeting as a fully-fledged member. There was no Guest Speaker for the night as we were having a social evening and were entertained by our own members.

- President Peter advised that December is Rotary Disease Prevention and Treatment Month
- Birthdays this week were Yvonne O'Connor-Pembleton (10/12) and Bryan Short (14/12) and as this
 was our actual meeting night, he was the lucky recipient of a rousing rendition of Happy Birthday.
 There were no Rotary Anniversaries, but Nepal and Dipa Ghosh celebrate their Wedding
 Anniversary in the coming week.
- Peter spoke to Nick Skinner from Mt Austin Clontarf and passed on our congratulations to the Dance troupe for their special segment at the Finale of the Schools Spectacular which featured Ivy Simpson.
- Sunday 17th December will be our final Family Fun Day for the year at Lyndal's gym. Peter and wife Lynne will be there. Members joined in spontaneous applause to thank Lyndal for her generosity in providing this fundraising opportunity for the Club.
- Peter also offered a special thankyou to Paul and Judy Galloway for hosting our Christmas Party, and also to Vicky and Ellen for our table decorations and looking after our donated presents. This was all very much appreciated.
- David Payne had to postpone the meeting of the Rotary Peace Ceremony committee, which he chairs, as he has Covid, and no one else could fill in for him.
- During the local March Against Domestic Violence last Friday, Inspector Jillian Gibson revealed that our Club would assist in building awareness of Elder Abuse – also referred to as Senior Safety, in the community. Peter is looking for feedback on whether this might be a Club Community Project. In regard to domestic abuse locally, the Police advised that in one day recently, they had 18 cases reported within Wagga Wagga.
- Peter had also received an email from Xiaoming Zheng, Chief Investigator and Senior Lecturer at CSU School of Medical Research. He is seeking volunteers over 55 years, relatively healthy and willing to be examined by 5-minute MRI every 4 months for 20 months. The activity is to look at brain behaviour and possible connection to Dementia. The research has been approved by the CSU Human Research Ethics Committee. Peter Smart has offered to do some further investigation into the project before we consider our involvement.

SHORT & SWEET:

Our Short and Sweet session this week was presented by Lyndal Seymour. She told the story about an 11-year-old girl, and being her mother's big girl, and helper.

As a normal kid, as Christmas approached, whenever she was alone near the Christmas Tree she would feel all the presents and check all the cards to see who was going to receive what. It had been a tough year for the family and whenever her mother looked at the tree, she would sigh and warn them - there would not be as much for Christmas this year, and her mother would periodically also say "giving is better than receiving". The daughter had trouble with such talk, as Christmas was all about jumping out of bed on Christmas Day and rushing to open Christmas presents.



On Christmas morning, all the family rushed to the living room and let the paper fly. As all the presents were handed out, her mother said here is another one for you, but it was not a present the girl recognised as hers during all her earlier inspections. It had been her mother's present with the card exchanged to now have her daughter's name on it. She said "Mum, I can't..." But her mother's eager face and words "Let's see what it is honey. Hurry and open it" encouraged her. So she did open it and it was a hair dryer. Being an 11-year-old, she was stunned.

As she grew up she always remembered that Christmas and the joy on her mother's face when she gave up her present and came to understand how it is better to give than receive.

A nice message to have reinforced as Christmas approaches.


