membership to a club in Queensland, again to spend more time with family; while Graeme Callander is also requesting leave of absence – he has some medical issues and is hoping to resume in July. Peter noted that it would be great to have a chance for a farewell 'hoorah' with them.

<u>Attendance.</u>

President Peter welcomed twenty-seven members to the meeting, plus our Key-Note Speaker, Josh Sarantakos who is fresh from attending the National Youth Science Forum as our nominee.

NYSF Coordinator Mathew Crouch was, unfortunately a late apology, having contracted COVID.

Administration Matters.

The following matters were discussed: -

- Vida Smart handed around the **Clontarf Breakfast Roster** for the first school term. Those not in attendance tonight could volunteer with Vida next week.
- A Peace Day Meeting was held during the week. There are plans for some entertainment this year with the Male Rugby Choir and possibly some dancers from the Clontarf Troupe and an ethnic dance ensemble. This is awaiting confirmation. David Payne seeks nominees for the Peter & Helen Walsh Memorial Award by Australia Day (suggestions to David please ASAP).
- Peter reported that on the final day for the year at the **Airborne Gym**, he and Lynne collected \$340-00 for the club our thanks to Lyndal Seymour.
- An offer for the club to act as parking marshals at the State Touch Carnival in February was declined after discussion.
- **President Elect for 2024/25** John Heazlewood indicated that as yet, we don't have a President Elect for the year following his. This is, of course very important, and John urges all members to consider the role or to encourage others they regard as suitable, to accept nomination.

David Kennedy took over the role and used the opportunity to show the video clip in which Cliff Dochterman, who became Rotary International President 1992/93 traces the origins of the Rotary International's Polio Eradication Program. Asked by Clem Renouf RI President 1978/79 to join a committee looking at developing the ability for significant world health issues to be tackled using the world-wide Rotary resources, the "3-H" grants program was developed, designed to undertake large-scale

service projects beyond the capacity of individual Rotary clubs or groups of clubs. The first "3-H" program, in 1979 involved an attack on Polio in the Philippines involving vaccinating all children in that country, and this led to polio being selected as a project to be tackled by Rotary world-wide. Consultation with world experts

such as Dr. Sabin established the huge challenge involved. Within a few years in 1987, \$US240 million had been raised and an amazing reduction in cases became a reality as funding continued, Today only one country, Afghanistan, has cases. Resources are still needed to maintain this programme.

Fines-Master Session.

Graham Russell stepped into the fray to cover a vacancy and in short order produced a few from his fund of jokes which he aimed at all and sundry. Beer drinking, slow jockeys and a pub painted nipple pink emerged.

<u>Key-Note Speaker</u>

Anthony Bosco introduced Josh Sarantakos, praising his interest in using science to make the world a better place and giving up some of his holidays to attend the recent National Youth Science Forum, which is in its 40th year. Josh told us that he spent eight days at the forum, attending at ANU in Canberra and other venues.



They started with a tour mentored by attendees from previous forums and learned about science – what it means – in more detail. Next on the program introduced robotics, and a program at Questacon with a focus on cybersecurity. They visited a deep space facility, learned about an underground facility in Switzerland and had talks about jobs in aerospace. A visit to Snowy 2.0 was included. They toured the laboratories of professors and learned of their projects.

A huge range of science aspects were revealed and entry requirements to some courses discussed. They also had talks from previous

attendees who had gone on into relevant careers. A great debate was held one evening. Josh said he has gained a lot of knowledge from the Forum, has formed friendships all over Australia as a result of his attendance and thanked Wagga Rotary for his nomination.

JOHN GOLDSWORTHY SCHOLARSHIP: -

Every year, the Rotary Club of Wagga Wagga funds a scholarship at the Riverina Conservatorium of Music (RCM), in memory of our Past President John Goldsworthy PHF.

The recipient for 2024 is classical guitarist, Tristan Tait who appears in the adjacent photograph receiving his award from the RCM Director, Hamish Tait and his teacher Dr Harold Gretton.

We hope to encourage Tristan to visit our Club one evening to demonstrate his craft.

ROTARY LUNCHEON



Satisfaction was expressed at the receipt of a cable message from the headquarters of Rotary, in America, offering congratulations on the extension of Rotary under charter to Wagga. It is expected that the charter will be received with in the next few weeks, when arrangements will be made for the opening or charter luncheon, at which it is expected there will be several visitors from other centres.

The 'talk' for the day was given by Rotarian Dr. C. B. Sim on 'Radiology and Radiography.' Dr. Sim interestingly traced the history of Rontgen rays up to the present marvel of radio work. The 'talk' was listened to with very great interest and pleasure.


